Chapter One

General Information

I. Policy

This guide contains policy and procedural guidance that were compiled from Air Force Instruction 36-2903 and Air Force ROTC Instruction 36-2001. The material contained herein is directive in nature; however, it cannot provide rules for every imaginable situation. Therefore, pride, professionalism, and common sense must sometimes prevail. Kaiserslautern High School Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets must comply with the uniform wear and personal appearance standards.

II. Procedure

The Air Force Junior ROTC uniform is, with certain exceptions, the same as that worn by active-duty personnel. Cadets must constantly be aware of the responsibility for maintaining it in good order, and wearing it correctly. Each member of the cadet corps must maintain high standards of dress and personal appearance. Cadets will present a neat and well-groomed appearance to the public at all times and locations, on and off campus, during, and after the school day.

After receiving the uniform, cadets will acknowledge receipt of these items by affixing their signatures to a Uniform Issue Receipt. By signing the receipt cadets agree to exercise all responsible caution and care to assure that items of Air Force property are cared for and not damaged due to carelessness, neglect, or improper cleaning and/or laundering methods. Cadets will be required to reimburse the Air Force for any uniforms lost or damaged due to neglect or accident. Furthermore, cadets are required to return all uniform items to the ASI upon demand and at least two weeks prior to leaving the GR-081st AFJROTC Group. All items will be professionally cleaned prior to turn-in.

AFJROTC 34-1 states that every cadet enrolled in the program is required to wear the cadet uniform a minimum of once per week. The GR-081st uniform wear day is Wednesday and Thursday, whichever day your class period falls under according to block scheduling. The uniform for the following week will be posted by the Deputy Group Commander on a bulletin board in the classroom.

If a cadet is absent on a uniform day, it is required that the cadet will be in uniform on the day of return to JROTC class. It is the responsibility of the cadet to ensure that the make-up grade is recorded on a make-up inspection form. Cadets not in uniform on a uniform day must have permission from the SASI or ASI. The cadet will receive a zero unless excused. It is the responsibility of the cadet to ensure that the uniform is available and in inspection condition on a uniform day. "It is in the cleaners or in the alterations shop" is not a legitimate excuse.

Cadets will be graded on their uniform appearance, condition, placement of insignia, condition of shoes, military bearing, and haircut and styles. One missed inspection in any quarter

will result in reduction of cadet's grade by approximately 10%, two missed inspections will result in a reduction of approximately 20%, and three missed inspections in any quarter will result in an "F" for that term in AFJROTC. If a cadet is doing poorly academically, two missed uniform inspections could lower the grade to a failing grade.

III. General Guidelines

- Keep the uniform neat and clean it as necessary
- Wear headgear when outdoors, remove it when indoors
- Keep your hands out of your pockets
- Keep all pockets buttoned, coats completely buttoned, and jackets zipped halfway
- Do not fill pockets with bulky items
- Keep shoes shined, including the heels and edge of the soles
- Keep all metal devices, buckles and badges clean and free of scratches
- Check your personal appearance in a mirror
- Do not leave items unattended or in unlocked or shared lockers
- Do not lend items to other cadets
- Turn in any found uniform items to an AFJROTC instructor
- Return uniform items that become worn or otherwise unserviceable to the ASI. If unserviceable due to purposeful destruction, it will be replaced by the cadet.
- Keep ribbons clean and replace when they become worn or faded

IV. Restrictions

Unless specifically authorized by the Senior Aerospace Science Instructor, cadets will only wear the uniform while traveling to and from school, to participate in Junior ROTC approved programs, or while participating in official activities.

- The uniform will not be mixed or worn with any civilian type clothing
- Cadets will not lend their uniform to anyone
- Distinctive items of the JROTC uniform (ranks, badges, nametags, etc.) will not be worn on civilian clothing
- The uniform will not be worn while hitchhiking
- No soliciting is allowed while in uniform
- Cadets will not wear the uniform while participating in student demonstrations, or crowd control, or in any other inappropriate activity where wear of the uniform may give the appearance that the Air Force is advocating some political or religious issue over another
- While in uniform, cadets will not exhibit public display of affection (PDA). This includes, but is not limited to: holding hands, hugging, kissing, etc.
- Do not wear with other clothing
- Do not wear earphones or headphone while in uniform, unless required for duty

V. Issue and Maintenance

Each cadet will be issued a complete uniform at the beginning of each year. After every cadet is issued a uniform, if available, a second pair of pants/slacks, shirt/blouse, belt, tie/tab, flight cap, and insignia will be issued. Additionally, a light weight jacket, windbreaker, may be issued. Once issued, it is the cadet's responsibility to maintain all items in a clean and orderly condition throughout the school year. The service dress coat, lightweight jacket, slacks or pants, tie/tab and cover are to be professionally dry-cleaned only. The shirt or blouse and socks are the only washable items. All uniform items must be turned in two weeks prior to the end of the school year or when a cadet drops from the Air Force Junior ROTC program. The only issued items that may be kept are the socks, shoes, belt, and PT uniform.

Chapter Two

Personal Appearance

I. General

Uniform	Neat, clean, pressed, in good condition, zipped or buttoned
Footwear	Shined (including heels and edge of the soles) and in good condition
Watch	Conservative, no wider than 1 inch
Bracelet	Conservative, no wider than one inch, “Livestrong” and similar bracelets not allowed, only exception is POW/MIA bracelets.
Rings	Conservative, no more than a total of three at any one time
Earrings	Male – Will not wear while in uniform Female – Small spherical, conservative, diamond, gold, white pearl, silver or Black. Pierced or clip on earrings may be worn while in uniform. They must fit tightly without extending below the earlobe. Only one earring per earlobe, in bottom hole.
Eyeglasses	Must be free of ornamentation on frames and lenses. Conservative, clear, slightly tinted or photosensitive lenses may be worn in uniform indoors while in military formation. Conservative lenses and frames outdoors. Faddish styles and mirrored lenses are prohibited.
Sunglasses	Must be free of ornamentation on frames and lenses. Will not be worn in formation, not to be worn around the neck or up on top of head while in uniform, Faddish styles prohibited.
Pencils/Pens	Concealed
Beepers	Concealed
Cell Phones	Concealed
Headphones	Prohibited
Necklaces	Prohibited
Nail Polish	Male Cadets – Will not wear nail polish while in uniform Female Cadets – Will be conservative, single color, and in good taste. Will not contain ornamentation, French tips are authorized

II. Female Cadet Hair Guidelines

Hair Will Be

- Clean, well groomed and neat. If dyed it will look natural.
- Styled to present a professional appearance. It will be styled to permit proper wear of the headgear. This means that the hair should not be too full or high on the head.
- Plain, conservative pins, combs, headbands, elastic bands and barrettes, similar to the individual’s hair color are permitted to keep the hair in place. Hair ornaments, such as ribbons or jeweled pins will not be worn; small braids are authorized.

Hair Will Not

- Contain an excessive amount of grooming aids (greasy creams, oils or sprays)
- Touch eyebrows when groomed or protrude below the front band of properly worn headgear; however it may be visible in front of a woman's flight cap. However, long hair will be secured with no loose ends.
- Exceed three (3) inches in bulk or prevent proper wear of headgear. (Note: "Bulk" means the distance that the hair projects from the scalp when groomed as opposed to length of hair)
- Worn in an extreme fad or style.
- Hair will not extend below the bottom edge of the blouse collar at the back of the neck. Even if you wear a ponytail, your hair must not hang below this point.
- No shaved heads or flat tops
- Micro and corn roll are authorized for women.

III. Male Cadet Hair Guidelines

Hair Will

- Be clean, well groomed and neat. Must not contain excessive amounts of grooming aids (greasy creams, oils or sprays.) If dyed, it will look natural.
- Have a tapered appearance on both sides and back. A tapered appearance is one that when viewed from any angle, outlines the individual's hair so it conforms generally to the shape of the skull.

Hair Will Not

- Be worn in an extreme style, fad style, or in such a way that exceeds length and bulk standards, no braids or logos
- Touch the ears, eyebrows or shirt collar. Hair will not protrude below the hatband of properly worn headgear.

- Exceed 1 1/4 inches in bulk. (Note: "Bulk" is the distance that the hair projects from the scalp when groomed. The bulk and length of the hair must not interfere with the proper wear of headgear.)

Beards

- Will not be worn in uniform.

Sideburns

- Will be neatly trimmed and tapered in the same manner as the haircut.
- Will be straight and of even width (not flared) and end in a clean-shaven horizontal line.
- Will not extend below the lowest part of the exterior ear opening.

Mustache

- Will not extend downward beyond the lip line (vermillion) of the upper lip or extend sideways beyond a vertical line drawn upward from the corner of the mouth.

IV. Tattoos and Body Piercing

Tattoos/Brands

- Tattoos/brands anywhere on the body that are obscene, advocate sexual, racial, ethnic or religious discrimination are prohibited.
- Excessive tattoos/brands will not be exposed or visible while in uniform. Excessive is defined as any tattoo/brand that exceeds 1/4 of the exposed body part and those above the collarbone and readily visible when wearing an open collar uniform.

Body Piercing

- When in uniform, cadets are prohibited from attaching, affixing or displaying objects, articles, jewelry or ornamentation to or through the ear, nose, tongue, eyebrow or any exposed body parts (includes being visible through uniform). No strings, wires, or plastic plugs will be used. Band-Aids will not be used to cover unacceptable piercings.

Chapter Three

Male Cadet Uniform

I. Belt

Dark blue with silver tip, worn by threading through the belt loop to the wearer's left. The silver tip extends beyond the buckle to the wearer's left with no blue fabric showing. The male cadet "gig" line is the straight line formed by the front edge of the shirt, the belt buckle, and the trousers fly.

II. Service Dress Coat, Blue

Coat should follow the contours of the figure, but allow ease of movement without pulling in the back of the waist. With arms hanging naturally, sleeves should end 1/4 inch from the heel of the thumb. Bottom of the coat should be fingertip length when hands are slightly cupped. All buttons must be buttoned. Flat items may be carried in the inside pockets. The coat will have the unit patch on the right sleeve and AFJROTC patch on the left sleeve. The coat and slacks must match the color shade and material.

III. Flight Cap, Blue

Worn slightly to the right with vertical crease at center of the forehead in a straight line with the nose and approximately one inch above the eyebrow. The crown will not be crushed.

IV. Jacket, Blue Windbreaker

Should fit loosely over the hips when zipped. Cuffs of the sleeves should cover the wrists, but not extend beyond. Blouse is not exposed below the jacket. Jacket must be zipped up at least halfway. The windbreaker will not be worn over the service dress jacket or with civilian clothing. The unit patch will be worn on the right side and the AFJROTC patch on the left side.

V. Shirt, Light Blue, Long Sleeve

Sleeves should extend to the heel of the thumb. Shirt is always worn with the tie and the top button is always buttoned. The shirtsleeves will remain buttoned.

VI. Shirt, Light Blue, Short Sleeve

This shirt may be worn with a tie or with open collar. If worn with an open collar, a "V" neck tee shirt must be worn so that no top of the tee shirt is visible. When wearing a tie, all buttons will be buttoned. When not wearing a tie all buttons except the top button are buttoned. Under either option, the shirt tail is pulled down into the trousers tightly and tucked at the sides to make it nearly form-fitting. The only creases on the shirt are down the sleeves. Nothing is carried in the pocket.

VII. Socks

Socks must be black. Other dark colors are not authorized

VIII. Tie, Blue

The tie will be tied appropriately and smartly. The tip of the tie will extend no more than 1 ½ inches above or below the belt line. It is worn under the collar and is not tucked into the shirt

IX. Trousers, Dark Blue

Trim fitted with no bunching at the waist or bagging at the seat. The bottom of the trousers will rest on the front of the shoes with a slight break in the creases. The trousers must be of matching material to the service coat and the cap. The rear pocket of the trousers will be buttoned always and articles should not be bulky and not be visible. The zipper tab will be pressed down to permit the fly to be neatly closed.

X. Shoes, Black Male Oxford

Shoes will be laced to the top and will be highly shined. The soles and heel edges will be coated with sole and heel dressing. Optional high gloss black corfam shoes or patent leather are authorized for wear at the cadet's own expense, according to annual information letters. (Chapter Eight, Cadet Guide)

XI. Service Cap

Service Cap (wheel cap) and large insignia may be purchased at cadet's expense and worn, with permission of SASI, by cadet officers.

XII. Berets

May be purchased at cadets expense and worn, with permission of SASI, by current members of a competition drill team.

XIII. AFJROTC Shoulder Patch

Wear of the AFJROTC official shoulder patch is mandatory on all uniforms except the raincoat, overcoat, and all-weather coat. Cadets enrolled in Civil Air Patrol (CAP) and AFJROTC who use the same uniform for both activities may wear the CAP wing patch on the right shoulder and the AFJROTC patch on the left shoulder with the AFJROTC shoulder patch taking precedence.

XIV. Shoulder Cords

Cadets are authorized to wear one shoulder cord on the left shoulder. Wear the shoulder cord only on light blue shirt and the service dress coat. On the service dress coat, cords should be pinned to the shoulder with the pin hidden beneath the cord.

Chapter Four

Female Cadet Uniform

I. Belt

Dark blue with silver tip, worn by threading through the belt loop to the wearer's right. The silver tip extends beyond the buckle to the wearer's right with no blue fabric showing. The female cadet "gig" line is the straight line formed by the front edge of the shirt, the belt buckle, and the slacks fly.

II. Service Dress Coat, Blue

Coat should follow the contours of the figure, but allow ease of movement without pulling in the back of the waist. With arms hanging naturally, sleeves should end 1/4 inch from the heel of the thumb. Bottom of the coat should be fingertip length when hands are slightly cupped. All buttons must be buttoned. Flat items may be carried in the inside pockets. The coat will have the unit patch on the right sleeve and AFJROTC patch on the left sleeve. The coat and slacks must match the color shade and material.

III. Flight Clap, Blue

Worn slightly to the right with vertical crease at center of the forehead in a straight line with the nose and approximately one inch above the eyebrow. The crown will not be crushed.

IV. Jacket, Blue Windbreaker

Should fit loosely over the hips when zipped. Cuffs of the sleeves should cover the wrists, but not extend beyond. Blouse is not exposed below the jacket. Jacket must be zipped up at least halfway. The windbreaker will not be worn over the service dress jacket or with civilian clothing. The unit patch will be worn on the right side and the AFJROTC patch on the left side.

V. Shirt, Light Blue, Long Sleeve

Sleeves should extend to the heel of the thumb. Shirt is always worn with the tab and the top button is always buttoned. The shirtsleeves will remain buttoned.

VI. Shirt, Light Blue, Short Sleeve

This shirt may be worn with a tab or with open collar. When wearing a tab, all buttons will be buttoned. When not wearing a tab all buttons except the top button are buttoned. Under either option, the shirt tail is pulled down into the trousers tightly and tucked at the sides to make it nearly form-fitting. There also is a different style of the same shirt in which tucking is not required. The only creases on the shirt are down the sleeves. Nothing is carried in the pocket.

VII. Socks/Hose

Black, commercial socks without design will be worn with slacks and oxfords. Hose can be worn with all uniform combinations but must be black, dark blue, or neutral shades that compliment the uniform and the cadet's skin tone.

VIII. Tab, Blue

The tab will be worn under the collar of the light blue shirt, short or long sleeve, in a smart and appropriate fashion.

IX. Slacks, Dark Blue

Trim fitted with no bunching at the waist or bagging at the seat. The bottom of the slacks will rest on the front of the shoes with a slight break in the creases. The slacks must be of matching material to the service coat and the cap. Articles should not be bulky and not be visible. The zipper tab will be pressed down to permit the fly to be neatly closed

X. Shoes, Black Female Oxford

Shoes will be laced to the top and will be highly shined. The soles and heel edges will be coated with sole and heel dressing. Optional high gloss black corfam shoes or patent leather are authorized for wear at the cadet's own expense. Additionally, females may purchase black leather pump shoes, with a heel of no more than 1 ½ inch to be worn with any uniform combination.

XI. Service Cap

Service Cap (wheel cap) and large insignia may be purchased at cadet's expense and worn, with permission of SASI, by cadet officers.

XII. Berets

May be purchased at cadets expense and worn, with permission of SASI, by cadets qualified and currently members of a competition drill team.

XIII. Skirts

While not issued by the unit, skirts may be purchased at cadet's expense. Hem will be no more than ½ inch above or ½ inch below the center of the kneecap. Alteration at cadet's expense. Your skirt should fit smoothly, should hang naturally, and must not be excessively tight. You must wear hosiery with the skirt. Choose a sheer nylon in a neutral dark brown, black, off-black, or dark blue shade that complements the uniform and your skin tone. Pumps or heels must be worn with the skirt and are also purchased at cadet's expense.

XIV. AFJROTC Shoulder Patch

Wear of the AFJROTC official shoulder patch is mandatory on all uniforms except the raincoat, overcoat, and all-weather coat. Cadets enrolled in Civil Air Patrol (CAP) and AFJROTC who use the same uniform for both activities may wear the CAP wing patch on the right shoulder and the AFJROTC patch on the left shoulder with the AFJROTC shoulder patch taking precedence.

XV. Shoulder Cords

Cadets are authorized to wear one shoulder cord on the left shoulder. Wear the shoulder cord only on light blue shirt and the service dress coat. On the service dress coat, cords should be pinned to the shoulder with the pin hidden beneath the cord.

Chapter Five Badges

I. Ground School Badge

Awarded for completion of the AFJROTC aviation honors ground school curriculum or completion of another aviation ground school program prescribed by the FAA. Cadets may wear the badge after the first grading period if they received a passing grade.

II. Awareness Presentation Team Badge

Awarded for participation on an Awareness Presentation Team. Criteria for becoming a member of the team should be published in the Cadet Guide or the Unit Operating Instructions.

III. Kitty Hawk Air Society Badge

Awarded to cadets who are members of the Kitty Hawk Air Society.

IV. Distinguished AFJROTC Cadet Badge

This annual award consists of a certificate and the Distinguished AFJROTC Cadet badge. The award recognizes one outstanding second-year cadet (third-year cadet in a 4-year program) selected at the end of each school year. This allows the recipient to wear the award their final year in the AFJROTC program. The recipient must be of high moral character, demonstrate positive personal attributes, display outstanding military potential, and maintain consistent academic and military excellence.

The recipient should hold the following awards prior to selection:

- Leadership Ribbon
- Achievement Ribbon
- Superior Performance Ribbon
- Academic Ribbon
- Cocurricular Activities Leadership Ribbon
- Service Ribbon

V. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Academic Cadet Badge

Awarded to rising Junior and Senior cadets for academic excellence as signified by attaining an overall 3.3 grade point average with no grade below “C” on their transcript. The individuals must be recommended by the SASI.

VI. Model Rocketry Badge

Awarded to cadets who have fulfilled model rocketry program requirements.

VII. Other Badges

Wearing badges from other services beyond their intended purpose, badges from the regular Air Force, or other organizations on the AFJROTC uniform is prohibited. Example: Unit cannot designate Army Signal Corps or Infantry badges to signify membership in the unit color guard or drill team. However, badges earned by cadets enrolled in a sister service JROTC program may be worn on the AFJROTC uniform in the location specified by the sister service. The AFJROTC badge location will always take precedence over the sister service badge.

Chapter Six

AWARDS AND DECORATIONS

Each school year, cadets have an opportunity to earn various national and AFJROTC awards and certificates.

These awards are awarded at the end of each school year or at the end of First and Second Semester. Many of the national awards are presented by retired military veterans affiliated with distinguished organizations such as Veterans of Foreign Wars, Air Force Association, American Legion, etc.

AFJROTC cadets are authorized to wear ribbons earned while enrolled in United States Army, United States Navy, or United States Marine Corps JROTC. AFJROTC cadets will wear AFJROTC ribbons above and to the left of other service JROTC ribbons or awards. Group ribbons according to service with the order of precedence determined by the regulations of each service. Other services' ribbons are grouped by service in the following order: Army, Navy, and Marine Corps.

Badges or insignia from Active Duty, Guard, Reserve, or any other non-AFJROTC group are not authorized on the AFJROTC uniform. Badges, ribbons or insignia from middle school programs such as Youth Leadership Corps are not authorized on the AFJROTC uniform.

Valor awards from all services are worn ahead of all other ribbons from any service. The AFJROTC Valor Awards will be worn first, with other services' Valor Awards worn in the following order: Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard.

Descriptions and Criteria

Gold Valor Award.

Awards consist of a medal, ribbon, and certificate. The Gold Valor Award recognizes the most outstanding voluntary acts of self-sacrifice and personal bravery by a cadet involving conspicuous risk of life above and beyond the call of duty.

Silver Valor Award.

Awards consist of a medal, ribbon, and certificate. The Silver Valor Award is awarded to a cadet for a voluntary act of heroism which does not meet the risk-of-life requirements of the Gold Valor Award.

Cadet Humanitarian Award.

Award consists of a ribbon and certificate. It is intended to recognize cadets who provide aid in response to a singular extraordinary event such as a natural disaster or other catastrophe that has placed or has the potential to place a hardship on their fellow citizens. This award is not to be used to recognize day-to-day service in the community.

Community Service with Excellence Award.

Award consists of a ribbon and certificate. It is intended to recognize those individual cadets who provide significant leadership in the planning, organizing, directing, and executing of a major unit community service project that greatly benefit the local community. This is not an award given to participants but to the key leader(s) of the project.

Air Force Association (AFA) Award

This AFA-sponsored award consists of a medal and ribbon and is presented annually at each unit to the outstanding second-year (in a 3-year program) or third-year cadet (in a 4-year program).

The award recipient must possess/meet the following personal characteristics and eligibility criteria:

- Positive attitude (toward AFJROTC and school).
- Outstanding personal appearance (uniform and grooming).
- Display personal attributes such as initiative, judgment, and self-confidence.
- Courteous demeanor (promptness, obedience, and respect for customs).
- Growth potential (capacity for responsibility, high productivity, adaptability to change).
- Possess the highest personal and ethical standards and strong positive convictions.

Daedalian Award.

The Order of Daedalians is a fraternity of commissioned pilots from all military services. It is named after the legendary figure, Daedalus, and was organized by WWI military pilots who sought to perpetuate the spirit of patriotism, love of country, and the high ideals of self-sacrifice which place service to the nation above personal safety and position. This award is offered to encourage the development of these traits in cadets and to interest them in a military career. The medal is fashioned after an ancient Grecian plaque discovered by a Daedalian in the village of Lavadia, Greece and depicts Daedalus and his son Icarus fabricating their legendary wings of wax and feathers. The award also includes a ribbon.

This annual award recognizes one outstanding third-year cadet at each unit that meets the following criteria:

- Demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of patriotism, love of country, and service to the nation.

American Legion Scholastic Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal accompanied by a ribbon with a distinctive miniature attachment depicting a scholastic scroll.

This award is presented annually to one second- or third-year cadet (in a 3-year program) or a third- or fourth-year cadet (in a 4-year program) based on the cadet's overall scholastic achievements. Each cadet must:

- Demonstrate leadership qualities.
- Actively participate in student activities.

American Legion General Military Excellence Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal accompanied by a ribbon with a distinctive miniature attachment depicting a torch.

This award is presented annually to one second- or third-year cadet (in a 3-year program) or a third- or fourth-year cadet (in a 4-year program) based on the cadet's general military excellence. Each cadet must:

- Rank in the top 25% of their AFJROTC class.
- Demonstrate outstanding qualities in military leadership, discipline, character, and citizenship.

Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal and ribbon.

This award is presented annually to one third-year (in a 3-year program) or fourth-year cadet (in a 4-year program) that meets the following criteria:

- Demonstrate qualities of dependability and good character.
- Demonstrate adherence to military discipline.

- Possess leadership ability and a fundamental and patriotic understanding of the importance of JROTC training.

American Veterans (AMVETS) Award.

This award consists of a medal pendant and ribbon.

This award is presented annually to one qualified cadet that possesses individual characteristics contributing to leadership such as:

- A positive attitude toward Air Force JROTC programs and service in the Air Force.
- Personal appearance (wearing of the uniform, posture, and grooming, but not physical characteristics per se).
- Personal attributes (initiative, dependability, judgment, and self-confidence).
- Officer potential (capacity for responsibility, adaptability, and maintenance of high personal standards).
- Obtained a grade of “A” (or the numerical equivalent) in their AS class.
- Be in good scholastic standing in all classes at the time of selection and at the time of presentation.

Reserve Officers Association (ROA) Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal, ribbon, and certificate.

This award is presented annually for military and academic achievement to an outstanding third-year cadet (fourth-year cadet in a 4-year program). The recipient must possess individual characteristics contributing to leadership such as:

- Positive attitude toward the AS curriculum.
- Outstanding personal appearance (wear of the uniform, posture, and grooming).
- Attributes of initiative, judgment, and self-confidence.
- Courtesy (promptness, obedience, and respect).
- Growth potential (capacity for responsibility, high productivity, adaptability to change).
- Demonstrate the highest personal and ethical standards and strong positive convictions.
- Rank in the top 10% of their AS class.

Military Order of World Wars Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal pendant, certificate, and ribbon.

This award is presented annually to an outstanding cadet who has committed to continue the aerospace science program the following school year. Selection is based on outstanding accomplishments or service to the AFJROTC unit.

Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) Award.

This award, formerly known as The Retired Officers Association Award, consists of a medal pendant with ribbon.

This award is presented annually to an outstanding second-year cadet (third-year cadet in a 4-year program) who shows exceptional potential for military leadership. Each cadet must:

- Be a member of the junior class.
- Be in good academic standing.
- Be of high moral character.
- Show a high order of loyalty to the unit, school, and country.
- Show exceptional potential for military leadership.

Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Award.

This award consists of a medal pendant with ribbon.

This award presented annually to an outstanding second- or third-year cadet in a 3-year program (third- or fourth-year cadet in a 4-year program) who is actively engaged in the AFJROTC program and who possesses individual characteristics contributing to leadership. Each cadet must:

- Have a positive attitude toward AFJROTC.
- Have outstanding military bearing and conduct.
- Possess strong positive personal attributes (such as courtesy, dependability, punctuality, respect, and cooperation).
- Demonstrate patriotism (being a member of the color guard or drill team) and actively promote Americanism.
- Demonstrate leadership potential.
- Attain a grade of “B” in AFJROTC with an overall average grade of “C” in all subjects for the previous semester.
- Be active in student activities.
- Not have been previous recipients of this award.

National Sojourners Award.

This award consists of a ribbon, medal pendant, and certificate.

This award is presented annually recognizing an outstanding first- or second-year cadet (second or third-year cadet in a 4-year program) who contributed the most to encourage and demonstrate Americanism within the corps of cadets and on campus. Each cadet must:

- Encourage and demonstrate ideals of Americanism.
- Demonstrate potential for outstanding leadership.
- Not have previously received the award.

Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) Award.

This award consists of a bronze medal with ribbon.

This award recognizes an outstanding second-year cadet in a 3-year program or third-year cadet in a 4-year program who is enrolled in the AFJROTC program. The recipient must exhibit a high degree of leadership, military bearing, and all-around excellence in AS studies and not have previously received the award. Each cadet must:

Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction Award.

This award consists of a medal, ribbon, and certificate.

This award annually recognizes an outstanding second-year cadet in a 3-year program or third-year cadet in a 4-year program. Each cadet must:

- Contribute the most to encourage Americanism by participation in extracurricular activities or community projects.
- Demonstrate academic excellence by being in the top 25% of class.
- Demonstrate the qualities of dependability, good character, self-discipline, good citizenship and patriotism.
- Not have been a previous recipient of this award.

Military Order of the Purple Heart Award.

This award consists of a medal pendant with a ribbon.

This award annually recognizes an outstanding second- or third-year cadet (third- or fourth-year cadet in a 4-year program) who is enrolled in the AFJROTC program and demonstrates leadership ability. Each cadet must:

- Have a positive attitude toward AFJROTC and country.
- Hold a leadership position in the cadet corps.
- Be active in school and community affairs.
- Attain a grade of “B” or better in all subjects for the previous semester.
- Not have been a previous recipient of this award.

Air Force Sergeants Association (AFSA) Award.

This annual award consists of a medal pendant with a ribbon.

This award recognizes an outstanding second- or third-year cadet in a three-year program (third- or fourth-year cadet in a 4-year program). The recipient must demonstrate outstanding qualities in military leadership, discipline, character, and citizenship. Each cadet must:

- Be in the top 25% of the AFJROTC class.
- Demonstrate outstanding qualities in military leadership, discipline, character, and citizenship.
- Not have been a previous recipient of this award.

Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) Award

This award consists of a medal pendant with a ribbon.

This award recognizes one deserving cadet annually (may be first, second, third, or fourth year cadet). The recipient must display a high degree of patriotism and have demonstrated a high degree of academic excellence and leadership ability.

Tuskegee Airmen Incorporated (TAI) Air Force JROTC Cadet Award

This TAI sponsored award consists of a ribbon and a certificate.

This award is presented annually to two cadets. Cadets may be first-year, second-year, or third-year cadets (in a 3- or 4-year program) and must meet the following criteria:

- Attain a grade of “B” or better in their AS class.
- Be in good academic standing.
- Actively participate in cadet corps activities.
- Participate in at least 50% of all unit service programs.

The Retired Enlisted Association (TREA) Award

Awarded annually for exceptional leadership to the most outstanding AFJROTC cadet while serving in an Enlisted Rank. The selected enlisted cadet must have shown outstanding leadership throughout the course of the school year. This award consists of a medal set with ribbon and a certificate from TREA.

Outstanding Cadet Ribbon

Awarded annually to the outstanding first-year, second-year, third-year, and fourth-year cadet. The recipient from each class must be of high moral character, demonstrate positive personal attributes, display outstanding military potential, and attain academic and military excellence.

Leadership Ribbon

Awarded for outstanding performance in a position of leadership as an AFJROTC cadet in corps training activities. Limit this ribbon to 5 percent of the eligible group to ensure recognition of cadets who have consistently displayed outstanding leadership ability above and beyond expected performance.

Achievement Ribbon

Awarded for a significant achievement as deemed appropriate by the SASI. Limit this ribbon to 5 percent of the cadet corps. Individuals may not receive more than one ribbon during a 1-year period.

Superior Performance Ribbon

Awarded annually for outstanding achievement or meritorious service rendered specifically on behalf of AFJROTC.

Distinguished Unit Award (DUA)

Awarded to cadets enrolled during the academic year when a unit is selected by HQ AFJROTC to receive the DUA. Units have to set and accomplish goals for the year to attain this award. If DUA is won by unit in multiple years then consecutive awards are denoted by single oak leaf clusters for each additional award. If during a Unit Evaluation the JROTC unit receives an “Exceeds Standards” as the overall evaluation and is identified by HQ AFJROTC as a unit “with merit” then unit is authorized the wear of a silver star on ribbon.

Aerospace and Technology Honors Camp Ribbon

Awarded for attendance at Honors Camp. This award consists of a Leadership School Ribbon with an “H” device and will be provided by HQ AFJROTC at the Honors Camp site.

Top Performer Award

The Cadet Top Performer Award is a Headquarters, AFJROTC award presented to a maximum of 2% of the current unit cadet corps population (unduplicated headcount). All currently enrolled cadets may be considered. Specific consideration should be given to cadets not previously recognized for superior performance

The award will recognize a cadet’s performance in the following key areas: Leadership and job performance: in primary duty and specifically in preparation for the unit’s annual assessment. Leadership qualities: involvement and positions held in extracurricular activities. Academic performance: nominee must be in good academic standing in all high school course work. Significant self-improvement. Community involvement. Other accomplishments.

Academic Ribbon

Awarded for academic excellence as signified by attaining an overall grade point average of at least “B” for one academic term, in addition to an “A” average in AFJROTC.

Outstanding Flight Ribbon

Awarded each academic term to members of the outstanding flight under criteria determined by the SASI.

Leadership School Ribbon

Awarded for completion of an approved leadership school program of at least 5 days duration. Add an “H” Device for completion of an Air Force Honors Camp (provided by HQ AFJROTC at camp site). Add a silver star for outstanding performance or leadership ability at a Leadership School. Limit the star to 10 percent of the class. This ribbon may only be earned once.

Drill Competition Ribbon

Awarded to drill team members for placing first, second or third place in an Air Force or Joint Service drill meet.

Cocurricular Activities Leadership Ribbon

Awarded at the SASI’s discretion for leadership in AFJROTC cocurricular activities (such as dining-in chairperson, military ball chairperson, etc.). The recipient must have demonstrated exceptional leadership in achieving objectives through the coordinated efforts of others. This award may be earned a maximum of four times. An oak leaf cluster should be added to this ribbon for each additional award.

Drill Team Ribbon

Awarded for distinguished participation in at least 75 percent of all drill team events per academic year, or 10 drill team events in an academic year, whichever is lower. An oak leaf cluster should be added to this ribbon for each year of qualifying membership beginning with the second year.

Color Guard Ribbon

Awarded for distinguished participation in at least 75 percent of all color guard events per academic year, or 10 color guard events in an academic year, whichever is lower. An oak leaf cluster should be added to this ribbon for each year of qualifying membership beginning with the second year.

Saber Team Ribbon

Awarded for distinguished participation in at least 75 percent of all saber team events per academic year, or 10 saber team events in an academic year, whichever is lower. An oak leaf cluster should be added to this ribbon for each year of qualifying membership beginning with the second year.

Service Ribbon

Awarded at the SASI's discretion for distinctive performance in school, community, or AFJROTC service projects. Limit to members whose active participation in a service project contributed significantly to the goals of the organization. Participation in Drill Teams, Saber Team or Color Guard does not qualify for the service ribbon.

Extreme Excellence Challenge (E2C) Ribbon

Awarded by the SASI for participation in the Extreme Excellence Challenge (E2C) physical fitness program. All cadets who participate in the E2C program will receive the Physical Fitness Ribbon. The Bronze Star device will be awarded and worn on the ribbon to any cadet scoring in the 80-89 percentile in the E2C program. If a cadet earns a percentile score of 90-99 they will wear a Silver Star. If they receive a perfect 100 percent they will wear the Gold Star on the ribbon.

Recruiting Ribbon

Awarded for outstanding effort in support of unit recruiting activities. The SASI awards this ribbon based on locally developed criteria, which must be included in the unit Cadet Guide or unit Operating Instructions.

Activities Ribbon

Awarded for participation in cocurricular activities other than Drill, Color Guard, and Saber teams. These include, but are not limited to orienteering teams, model rocketry clubs, AFJROTC academic teams, and AFJROTC sports teams. An oak leaf cluster should be added to this ribbon for each year of membership beginning with the second year. The SASI awards this ribbon using locally developed criteria which must be included in the Cadet Guide or unit Operating Instruction.

Attendance Ribbon

Awarded to cadets with no more than 4 excused absences and no unexcused absences in an academic term.

Good Conduct Ribbon

Awarded to cadets with no suspensions of any kind, no adverse reports from other staff or faculty in an academic term.

Dress and Appearance Ribbon

Awarded for wearing uniform on all designated uniform days and conforming to all AFJROTC dress and appearance standards.

Longevity Ribbon

Awarded for completion of each AS year.

CAP Awards

Only five CAP ribbons (General Carl Spaatz Award, General Ira C. Eaker Award, Amelia Earhart Award, General Billy Mitchell Award, and the General J. F. Curry Achievement Award) may be worn on the AFJROTC uniform.

Chapter Seven

Battle Dress Uniform

I. Wear

The Battle Dress Uniform is authorized for any cadet that wishes to purchase it. (Chapter Eleven, Cadet Guide) It is not a mandatory uniform. However, only cadets who are passing AFJROTC with a grade of a B or above and are not missing any uniform wear, are authorized to wear the BDU. Also, AS-1 cadets will be allowed to wear the uniform after successfully passing their first semester of AFJROTC. BDUs will only be worn on the last uniform inspection day of the month. Proper nametapes and patches will be worn, refer to attachment 1 for placement.

II. Care

BDUs must be neat and clean at all times. Cadets must also ensure that the uniform is pressed.

III. Blouse and Trousers

The blouse will not be tucked into the trousers. If worn with the sleeves rolled, the sleeve material must come within one inch or touch the forearm when the arm is bent at a 90 degree angle. All buttons except the very top button will be buttoned. Sleeves will remain buttoned at all times. The trousers will be worn on the hips and bloused using the blousing elastic. They will not simply be tucked into the boots. The blouse will not be removed except when within the AFJROTC complex and only with the permission of the instructor.

IV. Belt and Buckle

Subdued black belt and buckle will be worn at all times with the trousers. Black tip of belt may extend up to two inches beyond the buckle.

V. Undergarments

The crew neck, black T-shirt must be worn at all times

VI. Footwear

Black combat boots will be worn with black boot socks. Boots must be highly polished at all times.

VII. Headgear

BDU cap will be worn squarely on the head with no hair protruding in front of the cap. AFJROTC hat or rank insignia will be worn centered on the front of the hat.

VIII. Cold Weather

Cadets may purchase the BDU field jacket for wear during the winter. The field jacket must be configured the same as the BDU blouse. The unit will provide AFJROTC and unit patches. Cadets will provide appropriate AFJROTC and name tapes and all expenses for sewing or altering.

Chapter Eight

Physical Training (PT) Uniform


AFJROTC Physical Training (PT) Uniform. The PT uniform is a multi-purpose uniform provided at Air Force expense.

- I.** PT t-shirts must be tucked in.
- II.** Portions of the PT uniform may not be mixed with any combination of the Air Force uniform.
- III.** The PT uniform is not to be substituted for the weekly uniform day and will only be worn during AFJROTC events.
- IV.** PT uniforms will be worn on PT days on Friday. Cadet will be issued uniform during uniform issue. Cadet must have a top and bottom to receive PT uniform credit.

4. Unit patch: Placed $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
5. Shoulder tabs: Center between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1 inch below shoulder seam.
6. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Badge: see note 15.
7. Distinguished Cadet Badge: see note 15.
8. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) worn on both lapels. Airman Basic wear lapel insignia on both lapels. Place insignia halfway up the seam, resting on but not over it. Bottom of insignia is horizontal with the ground.
9. AFJROTC Patch: Placed $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 inch below shoulder seam, and centered.
10. Flight Solo or Flight Certificate Badge: see note 15.
11. Ground School Badge: see note 15.
12. Ribbons: Center, on but not over edge of pocket. Wear 3 or 4 in a row. Wear all or some.
13. Academy of Model Aeronautic Wings: worn 1 inch below pocket.
14. Model Rocketry Badge: worn 2 inches below AMA Wings or 3 inches below pocket if no AMA Wings are worn.
15. First badge placed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above name tag or ribbons and is centered horizontally. Additional badges placed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above previous badge.

* The metal nametag may only be worn if approved by the SASI for wear by all cadets

CADET LIGHTWEIGHT BLUE JACKET



1. (Officers only) When placing rank on epaulet instead of collar, use standard size metal rank, center on epaulet $5/8$ in from shoulder seam.
2. Shoulder tabs are centered between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1" below shoulder seam.
3. Unit patch on right sleeve $1/2$ to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
4. Grade insignia (officer and enlisted) is worn on both left and right collar. Airman Basic have no collar insignia.
5. Optional item: center vertically between the shoulder seam and where the underarm side seam joins the armhole sleeve and center horizontally between the center zipper and the sleeve armhole seam.
6. AFJROTC patch on left sleeve $1/2$ to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
7. Jacket will be closed to at least the halfway point.
8. Center insignia horizontally on collar. Place 1 inch from bottom of collar and parallel to the outer edge of the collar.


